EMMA IS HURTING AND NEEDS YOUR HELP.



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HOW PROFESSIONAL COUNSELING ALLEVIATES POVERTY

TEACHING ONLY WORKS WHEN A STUDENT IS EMOTIONALLY HEALTHY ENOUGH TO RECEIVE IT.

Emma represents all those students in our Catholic schools who show up with aches and pains that no ER can mend. Here in our diocese, we have 13,668 students, and many are dealing with emotional, behavioral or mental-health issues that keep them from academic success.

We see the symptoms every day: an unexplained sadness, a withdrawn demeanor, disruptive behaviors, or difficulty concentrating. Far from being garden-variety discipline problems, these students need our help to get at those deep hurts that hold them back.

And tragically, for many, these issues are a predictor of a life of poverty. Statistics show a strong correlation between a low level of academic achievement and poverty. In our diocese, 11% of households have an income of less than \$15,000.

This is why we are developing professional counseling services for these children and their families. By partnering with principals, guidance counselors and parents, we will use our clinical expertise to treat the hidden pains that prevent Emma from achieving her potential.

WE WERE MET WITH MANY REQUESTS.

When we announced our counseling program last year, we were met with many requests from diocesan priests and school personnel. One reason is affordability: many families cannot pay for the therapy, so we must find a way to subsidize it. Another reason is that students

referred for therapy to area clinics sometimes have to wait up to four months to see someone. With our counselor on site, the wait drops from months to days. More importantly, we provide professional counseling that Catholics can trust will conform to the teaching of the Church.

This is a joint effort to minister to families who are struggling with trauma, divorce, addiction, etc. Our first school program got underway in South Bend last year. As St. Matthew's principal Sister Gianna Marie reports,

The program expanded this year to St. Aloysius in Yoder. Our Clinical Liaison, Jess Adams (see her story on page 8), visits there one day a week. "It's been wonderful," says principal Tina Voors. "We are gaining a whole new perspective on the emotional needs of our kids."

HUMAN TRAFFICKING VICTIMS

There is a nationwide epidemic of sex and labor trafficking, and our diocese is no exception. Starting in late 2017, we will help freed victims deal with the trauma of their captivity and adjustment back into the community.



Our ambition is to eventually take our faithbased perspective and professional counseling services to the broader community. There are 1.2 million people in our diocese.

A FOUR-PART STRATEGY FOR MEETING OUR PROFESSIONAL COUNSELING NEEDS

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Diocesan schools are just the beginning. Like the students we serve today, there are many adults, couples and children outside our schools who are in need a trustworthy Catholic resource for mental-health counseling.

Our parish priests, Catholic schools' personnel, and entire 14 county community leaders tell us their greatest need is for Catholic Charities to provide professional counseling. Our research revealed that, when dealing with crises such as depression, addiction, overwhelming debt or sadness, and other chronic stressors, the consequences can be dramatic and life-altering.



We specialize in assisting clients who face complex, long-term issues that prevent them from moving ahead in their lives. These issues often require years of support to address successfully.

SHORT-TERM SOLUTIONS

The initial intervention typically addresses a need or crisis situation in the short-term, which is usually less than one year.

LOCAL CATHOLIC SOLUTIONS TO COMPLEX PROBLEMS PHASE 2 SERVICES

Many of our clients face complex, long-term issues that prevent them from moving ahead in their lives.

These issues often require years of support to address successfully. We describe these supports as **Phase 2 Services** (see Pyramid above) that often follow some initial intervention. When students are struggling, our Catholic school guidance counselors (see Phase 1 Services) are effective in dealing with most of these situations. There are times, however, when these students or their families need therapeutic counseling from an outside professional who is trained to get at the deep hurts that are not obvious. For example, if a student routinely exhibits disruptive behavior in class, (s)he might be referred to counseling at an off-site clinic, which can take months before the first visit. Now, though, with our professional counselor on site, the student or family can be evaluated in a matter of days and therapy can begin that will address the need. Plus, everyone has peace of mind from knowing that this therapy will conform to the teaching of the Catholic Church. Parents and priests have expressed gratitude for the immediacy and the Catholicity of treatment. Administrators have expressed appreciation for the services and commented that their eyes have been opened to broader emotional and psychological needs of their students. We are only in six schools at present and need to expand to all four high schools and 34 grade schools. We need your help to achieve this goal.

CLINICAL LIAISON TO PARISH PRIESTS MEET JESS ADAMS

Jess Adams is the newest addition to our Catholic Charities staff. When we discovered from research that mental-health services were the greatest need, we created the Clinical Liaison position. Jess's position serves as the first step in responding to the many counseling needs identified in our parishes and Catholic schools. Every week, parish priests and school staff encounter students and families, some of whom desperately need more help than they can offer. As a result, professional counselors are in great demand.

To understand how this works, consider the fictional Mr. and Mrs. Smith. They go to their pastor, seeking help with their marriage. He observes that the two are struggling with communication and would like to refer them to a qualified professional. Most importantly, he wants to make certain this counselor understands and honors the Catholic point of view of marriage as a sacrament.

After receiving the referral from the priest (or his designee), Jess will contact the parties to discuss their needs. She may ask if they have a preference for a male or female counselor, or perhaps one who speaks Spanish. With this information, she will seek out the right fit for their circumstances.

The Clinical Liaison position provides our priests with ongoing support when they need assistance accessing community mental-health resources for their parish or school families. We see this as a vital service so we as a Church can better respond to the emotional, psychological and spiritual needs of Catholics in our diocese.








2016-17 INCOME BY SOURCE




2016-17 EXPENSE BY SOURCE

Our Mobile Unit is vital to our mission of strengthening families and alleviating poverty in under-served areas of the diocese. Many times people in need do not have transportation to come to one of our three offices in Fort Wayne, Auburn or South Bend. So now we have the means to reach out to rural parishes, understand their needs, and bring those services to them.
